





The Howland House



- The Howland House was built in 1667 by a house carpenter named Jacob Mitchell.
- It was owned by the 8th son of John and Elizabeth, Jabez Howland from 1669-1680.
- Jabez Howland was a blacksmith in the Plimoth colony.
- They had 5 children while living in the house in Plimoth.
- The house was privately owned until the Pilgrim John Howland Society bought the house in 1912 for \$2,000.
- The house represents three distinct time periods 1667, 1710, and 1750



HOW TO DRESS LIKE A PILGRIM:

NO! Pilgrims wore many colors, like violet, blue, green, yellow, brown, gray and red-orange. Black fabric was actually too expensive for the Pilgrims, so they would not have worn it! Can you color these outfits to be historically accurate?



Wetu - House, made from either tree bark or grass mats covering a wood frame Mishoon - Canoe made from a hollowed out, burned log

Patuxet - One of the 69 villages that made up the Wampanoag nation

Quahog - A thick-shelled, edible clam

Kietan - The name of the Creator in Wampanoag tradition

Sachem - The chief of a village

Facts about John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley:

- John Howland fell off the *Mayflower* in a storm during the crossing of 1620 and had to be rescued.
- Elizabeth Tilley was 13 years old when she made the crossing on the *Mayflower*.
- Elizabeth Tilley lived with her family in Leyden, Netherlands, before she came to America.
- Elizabeth Tilley is about the same age as the famous artist, Rembrandt who was also from Leyden.


- Elizabeth Tilley came to America with her parents and her aunt and uncle, all whom died in the first winer.
- John Howland married Elizabeth Tilley in 1623.
 Together they had 10 children and 88 grandchildren!
